After completing the course I immediately got a job as an automobile technician in Chandra Auto center at Sarisha.

It was a great feeling to have a job and contribute to the family finances. Later I moved to T.V.S Dinesh Auto center located in Diamond Harbour and again for better

prospects I shifted to Yamaha Service center in Joka, where I work as a technician. I now earn about Rs.5000 per month!

I am grateful that with the help of the sponsorship program I have been able to beat the odds and come out a winner. I am very happy that I am in a position to support my family. Now I hope to establish myself as a highly skilled automobile technician.



At present I am working as a Physical Education Instructor at In-focus India Public School



Hello... I am Ashique Khan. My father Jamil Khan is a daily labourer. However hard he tried, he found it was difficult to make both ends meet. Often he went without work for days and weeks and so, naturally, he earned very little, poverty became an integral part of our lives.

Every day, each of us in the family would have to face our share of ordeals. In my case, for instance, one day when I was a Grade V student, I was shocked to know that my family's economic situation would not allow me to continue in school anymore. It was too harsh a reality to accept easily. That particular day is etched in my memory as the darkest day in my life.

The situation was so bad that my elder brother was required to take up some work immediately to supplement the family income. He set up a small makeshift tailoring shop. As I too was out of school, I had to help my brother with his tailoring job, but unlike him I had not received any tailoring training which could help me in this task.

I was emotionally shattered. I felt I was no good. I believed I was a failure. I was moving towards depression because I wasn't able to study; I couldn't excel in the work I was asked to do and most of all, nothing I did helped my family's economic situation.

It was at this juncture that Children International-SAHAY intervened and pulled me out of the dungeon I was pushed into. I was extended an opportunity to undergo a 4 month vocational training at Children International -SAHAY's Into-Employment program, close to my residence.

I am happy to tell you that I have completed the training successfully in 2010 since then, I have ben working with great pride in my brother's tailoring unit, which has expanded

in size today and has earned a good name and much praise in the locality for the quality of its workmanship.

What is most important to my family is that I have been a skilled worker, employed and earning Rs.3000 at an average every month. I know have the potential and prospect to earn more. Children International -SAHAY has helped build my confidence and shape my future productively.

Just as I could come out of despair and hopelessness, to establish myself with support from Children International-SAHAY; I am hopeful that a lot of other young people will also be able to benefit from this program.

Apart from this, in order to arm me with proper training that could help me earn a livelihood, I was extended the needed support for learning music as well as



My name is Bittu Mondal and I am still in the sponsorship program. We are a five member family. While my mother stays at home my father and both brothers work in factories located within the Special Economic Zone (SEZ).

As we had no land to farm, my father was a daily laborer and would often have to work under contractors who would hire his services for the day to some factory. In return, my father would have to pay the contractor a part of his daily wage.

Thus, it would be difficult for my mother to run the household on what my father would make. Once my brothers also joined my father at the SEZ, things became a little easier at home. However, as my brothers also had no professional training, they too had to be a part of the contractor's team and would be hired out as per requirement. They would also give the contractor a part of their earnings in return for the work.

While I was growing up, my mother would often cry in despair that I had dropped out of school. She would berate me for not taking complete advantage of the sponsorship program and studying hard to get a well paying job. Since I never enjoyed academics, I wanted to work with my hands so as soon as I was fourteen, I joined my father and brothers at the SEZ.

Since I was only fourteen, I worked as a general errand boy till I turned sixteen, when I was allowed into the shop floor to work on simple machines. As I had no skills or training I became an errand boy for all those who were working in the factory workshop. I would get a free meal and some money at the end of the day. Then I heard of this opportunity being offered by Children International-SAHAY. Having been in the sponsorship program, I knew a course run by Children International-SAHAY would address the needs faced by the

sponsored youth. So, I came to this center and took an aptitude test. I was lucky to be selected into the welding course.

Once I joined the course, I had to give up doing odd jobs in factories and concentrate wholly on the training that I was receiving. We had both theory and practical classes but I enjoyed the practical classes more than the theory classes as they honed my skills as a welder.

This training enabled me to get a job at Sigma Search Light Limited. With my income being added to the family kitty, we are now able to spend money on little extras that had not been possible so far. Even though I work long hours, there is job security, and the satisfaction of knowing that if I perform well I can grow within the organization. My thanks to Children International-SAHAY for making this happen.





I am Chandan Thakur from Pakuahat, which is about 350 kms from Kolkata. I have two brothers and a sister. I received assistance from HOPE scholarship to do a beautician/hair stylist course. I did the course with Progressive Creative Institute in Kolkata. I stayed in Boral and commuted to Kolkata daily. Then I did an internship for two years in Malda town.

Today, my little beauty and hair dressing salon in the village is a hub of activity with youth lining up to have their hair cut, styled and colored, modeled on their favorite Bollywood heroes. I earn about Rupees 10,000 per month in my own village doing what I love! I am a lucky man! Even though

I have 2 brothers, I am the one who cares for and supports my parents.

For a boy from a rural area that is far away from Kolkata, to set up his own beauty salon was astounding and unheard of venture – I have done that and very

successfully! I am also planning to employ some former sponsored youth so that they in turn become self-reliant. I am hopeful that I will be as good an employer as an entrepreneur.

I am Broja Acharya, a young man who wears many hats. I am a former Children International-SAHAY's sponsored youth from a village in West Bengal and I also dream of owning a café someday, while currently being the Manager of a Café Coffee Day outlet. I am a self-assured young man, who handles his jobs with élan. 
Nabakumar Chakraborty





I am happy to share with you that in spite of having to give up my studies; I feel satisfied for being able to bear the responsibilities of my parents and siblings.





I am Satyen Paik. I would like to narrate the truth of my life's achievements and dreams that was possible with the continuous support that I received from the sponsorship program of Children International-SAHAY.

Duly motivated by the staff at the center, I enrolled my name in a 4month long training program on Bedside Nursing in 2010. This training did not only give me the desired input and know-how of the work involved

I was just a little toddler in the pre-primary school in Vikurdihi village under Bankura Block-1 when in the year 1996 I was field notified into Children International-SAHAY's sponsorship program. My father earned a meager Rupees 400 every month by working as a daily labourer in a bread-making unit. We lived in distressing conditions in a one-room straw-roof hut along with a few close relatives. In the years to come, I had four more siblings. It is understandable therefore that in the face of this heavy burden of meeting the expenses for maintaining his big family, it was impossible for my father to bear the minimum cost of a proper education for me.

My inclusion in the sponsorship program therefore came as a great blessing for the family. All kinds of family benefits, and the educational support for me, helped us enormously in tackling our economic distress. I worked my way through school and after clearing my grade X Board examinations, is now in grade XI, while my siblings are presently studying in grades IX, V, IV and I respectively.

Worth mentioning here is that I stood third in the district level athletics meet earlier this year in my group of running and jumping events.

Given the limited growth opportunities available for me in the remote villages

where I live and the financial constraints of my family, it was difficult for me to develop my skills through regular trainings and give wings to my dreams of a career in athletics. I had to cross many deterrents in the form of various kinds of social restrictions. But I had confidence in my own capability and could pursue what I wanted through sheer hard work and strong will power



my skills in athletics and my trainers feel that I will be able to improve considerably and perform very well if I continue in the same way.

Swapan Maity

I am Swapan Maity. I was sponsored in 1994 when I was in Grade II. I am from the village Deoly, West Naichanpur, East Mednipur district. My father, Bahadur, was a betel leaf cultivator and our family of 6 was supported from his meager income. The family was forced to stop the

education of my siblings when my father developed glaucoma. As he could not see, he could no longer work. Our family was in dire straits. It was during this critical juncture that I was sponsored. Hence I am able to appreciate the value of sponsorship.

I completed my secondary education with 70.5% and then went on to complete my higher secondary course and scored 62.6%. It was during Grade XII that I received scholarship support for another 2 years and continued receiving it till the first year of graduation. After my B.A. 1st year examination, when the scholarship ended, it became very difficult to bear the education expenses. I knew I had been supported for many years by the sponsorship program, now it was my turn to take the responsibility of my future. So to manage my circumstances, I started looking for job and was able to succeed in the Indian Army clerkship examination.

Now I am a clerk with the Indian Army and our economic condition is gradually improving. We will be always grateful to the support that we had received from our sponsor and sponsorship program.

My mother says," We wanted one person from our family to be educated and the educational support like books, school supplies, tutoring; uniforms support

enabled Swapan to fulfill our dreams." I will fulfill her dreams, I have started to build a brick house in place of the thatched house that we used to live in, so that my parents and siblings can enjoy better living conditions.





I am Soumen Samanta, a youth who has graduated out of the Children International-SAHAY's child sponsorship program. I live in Tarakeswar, in the village of Teghori, with my parents and sister. I have taken up the responsibility of looking after the needs of my family and it is the sponsorship program that has made me capable of shouldering this responsibility.

Since childhood, my family was faced with poverty and it is during this time that my father came to know of the sponsorship program to which I was enrolled. I was then four years old. Since then, till the age of 19, the program took care of my educational, health and other basic needs of mine and my family.

Although I graduated from the program at the age of 19, my association with the program did not end here. With my interest in photography and with the encouragement from the organization to enhance my skills, I worked hard to improve my skills in photography. The organization recognized my skills and effort and gave me an opportunity to join as a Consultant

I am Subhas Pakhira. My father sells cooked food on the roadside from a cart, he earns about Rupees 2,000 a month. My brother also helps the family by working in the photography studio. As a child, I desperately wanted to study, but had little chance of realizing my dream until I joined Children International-SAHAY's sponsorship program. Through sponsorship, I was enrolled in school and motivated to pursue education further.

I have regularly received help from the sponsorship program, and I have continued my studies and art courtesy this program. After finishing school, I took admission tests at different art colleges for the Bachelor of Visual Arts course and gained admission to the Indian College of Art and Draftmanship, which is located near Kolkata. After completing my Bachelor's degree I also completed my master's degree. Studying art under such circumstances would have remained a dream without sponsorship. Because I received help from the sponsorship program, I could complete my education and go on to study art.



At night, when I have difficulty falling asleep, I think of the painting that I have created during the day and wonder whether I have been able to express my thoughts through my art, as it is my medium of expression. I am my worst critic, and I believe that I have to keep pushing myself to excel. I am scared of failure and not meeting my target and goals. If others give 100 percent, then I have to give 110 percent.





I am Sudipto Mondol. I was in the sponsorship program from the time I was 5 years old till I was 14 years of age, when I left the program. In these 9 years of being a sponsored child, I was exposed to an entirely new and previously unexplored world. Through sponsorship I gained a lot of experiences. Through the various skill-building workshops, I learned many things. I can definitely say that I would not be where I am today had it not been for the sponsorship program.

A major benefit of being in the sponsorship program is that one is provided with the opportunity of networking with professionals who can help shape one's life. Another benefit

is learning how to interact with people, and this is a big benefit for me. I was very shy as a child, and in my first stage appearance was a nervous wreck. Today, I anchor shows locally and even sing at local functions. I was also assigned his responsibility of anchoring for Children International-SAHAY's Annual Day program. From a lonely child to a confident young man



Sujata Naiya

"If I had not been part of sponsorhip program," Sujata said, "I would have probably led a very common place existence... seen but not heard by [my] community and peers, smothered by the unfair demands of a traditional society. The sponsorship program has equipped me with the knowledge and the training to successfully manage my own life, and also spread awareness on social issues in my community." And this is how it happened...

I have been able to beat the odds and come out a winner -

I was born in a village where gender inequality and unemployment are still rampant, but I have managed to rise above those barriers primarily with help from Children International-SAHAY's sponsorship program. I was sponsored in 1998 at the age of six and enjoyed my days in the program very much. All the benefits that I received like health care, nutritional screenings, educational assistance, clothing and other material support made my life much easier than some of my neighbours. I was also a peer educator in the Youth Health Crops program, teaching others about hygiene, reproductive health and general life skills. Infact I was also the co-facilitator of the program, a position which helped me win a scholarship to study therapeutic yoga and physiotherapy. I am thankful to my peers for thinking me capable enough to lead them as a cofacilitator.

I graduated from the program in 2009 and there came a turning point in my life – I met Sandeep, a dashing young man and we decided to marry with parental consent in the same year. Though traditionally parents or brothers bear the wedding cost, I did not let my brothers nor my father bear the wedding expenses. As it was my wedding I bore all the cost myself. Unfortunately, no one had though to discuss the issues of my working post marriage. Given my exposure, I took it for granted that I would

continue to work whereas, Sandeep thought otherwise. This became the issue of contention after our marriage and lead to a lot of mental stress and pain. I then decided to spare both of us the pain and filed for a divorce next year. As my family did not support my decision I continued to fend for myself. Even as I worked to earn a living I met lawyers and went ahead with the divorce proceedings as I wanted to lead a life of dignity free from oppressive pressures.

After completing the year long course on yoga and physiotherapy I was employed by VLCC, a fitness company. I worked with VLCC for a year and saved enough to build my parents a home. All this was happening while I was going through an emotional turmoil in my personal life, but it has made me a stronger person. Today, I am an independent yoga instructor. I am teaching others how to find balance in their lives through yoga and relief through physical therapy.

In her early twenties, Sujata is a selfemployed young woman who handles herself with a surprising degree of balance and agility, thanks to her daily yoga sessions. She is also proving that woman play important roles in their communities, all the while supporting her family on her income of Rupees 10,000 per month that exceeds her parents' combined monthly income.




A resident of Danga in Boral, I am Sultana Naskar, a physically challenged girl child from a poverty stricken family. Those were the times really! Life was so difficult! My parents, grandparents, an aunt and an elder brother made up my family and we all co-existed in a one-roomed hut with mud wall on one side and a thick growth of plants and leaves providing the cover on the other side. Here at home while my elder brother was a heart patient, my left hand was cut at the wrist and short of fingers. My father was only a vegetable vendor and his paltry income was just insufficient to meet the family expenses. Quite naturally, in the midst of so much crisis how could he have afforded to bear the cost of my brother and my medical treatment?

And then a sudden light of hope peeped into my life when my name got enrolled in the Children International- SAHAY's sponsorship program. I was only 6 years old when I became part of this sponsorship program. The program provided me with all kinds of support towards my education, health and nutrition and several kinds of family benefits, all of which gradually pulled me and my family out from the darkness of poverty and want.

As the years passed and I grew up and continued being in the sponsorship program, more opportunities came my way in the form of special trainings and workshops on drama, origami, developing leadership skills etc. These opportunities strengthened my character and built my confidence to face the challenges in my life with determination. Thus I was able to overcome my physical limitation as well as my family's poverty. I take care to dress well and always be cheerful. I am told that people like to meet me and I am the best dressed girl in the youth meetings!

Presently, I am pursuing my studies for a Bachelor's degree while at the same time working part time in a local Montessori school. Besides, in our locality, succumbing to regular requests, I train youth and children in different cultural programs. I am well-versed in Bengali, Hindi and English. I wish to share with you that I am very hopeful about completing my Master's degree course and qualifying as a full-fledged teacher.



"I am a living example of the impact child sponsorship can make in a developing nation" says Altaf when asked to comment about how sponsorship has affected him and his community. Life had been a struggle for Altaf. But then the Children International-SAHAY sponsorship program came along and equipped him with a 'never say die' attitude.

Altaf completed Grade XII at the age of 17 years and joined Vodafone as a Marketing Executive. Alongside he also pursued his Bachelors in Commerce.

After a few months he got a better offer from Shoppers Stop, a premier retail marketing chain and joined there as a Customer Care Executive.

the sponsorship support, his family, also deserves special thanks for encouraging him throughout his strife. Today, not only Altaf but also his siblings are well educated and make a good living.

A success story of a sponsored youth who through self confidence and hard work is today an executive in a leading IT Solutions company

I grew up in a small village in West Bengal, India. My father worked as a store clerk, earning less than Rs.1000 a month. My mother was often sick and could not work. Providing for my sisters and me on such a paltry income was practically impossible. The family was even forced to slip meals frequently. Without assistance, I would not likely have been able to pursue education and follow my dreams. With persistence and laborious effort, I took full advantage of my opportunities and excelled in academic pursuits. I cleared both my grade X and XII examinations and then also cleared the Joint Entrance Examination which guaranteed admission to attend the College of Engineering and Management. In addition to the Rs.3500 per month scholarship I received through Children International-SAHAY to help attend college, my community was so thrilled about my accomplishments that they united to further help cover my tuition costs. After completing the 4 year course in Computer Engineering & Management, I have worked in prestigious firms like Tata Consultancy Services and travelled to places like Japan, U.K. and South Africa on various assignments. Presently, I am working as Senior Software Engineer in Zensar Technology Limited which is a software company of the RRG conglomerate. Today, I am proud to say that I have a good monthly income and can now help my family

When I was a child, my father worked as a driver and my mother was a housewife. The average monthly income of our family was too little to meet our daily needs of food, clothing, education and the likes. I was fortunate to be included in the sponsorship program of the Children International – SAHAY. The support received through the sponsorship program was immensely beneficial not only for me but also for my family, in the areas of health, education, sanitation facilities, family assistance and overall development.
